Chemotherapy at Home Nurses

Heartlands Hospital Charity is delighted to fund the incredible work of Charlotte Coldrick and Harley Tombs, who work as Chemotherapy at Home nurses. Charlotte and Harley are based at Heartlands Hospital and visit cancer patients at home, to deliver their chemotherapy treatment. We caught up with them to find out more about their work.

What does being a Chemotherapy at Home nurse involve?

Charlotte: "We come into the hospital in the mornings and then go out to treat people in their homes treating between four and ten people every day. We deliver chemotherapy treatments and other supportive treatments. We treat patients who are housebound, have mobility issues or who are too unwell to leave the house."

What chemotherapy treatments do you offer?

Harley: "We offer chemotherapy treatments which are a five to seven day course, as well as weekly or twice weekly treatments. We also offer supportive care such as red or white blood cell stimulation treatment. Each month, we will deliver roughly 120 treatments in the area around Heartlands, East Birmingham, Shirley and Solihull."

So what are the benefits of this service to patients?

Harley: "This service saves our patients from having to come into hospital. Given their mobility issues, these patients would require patient transport which can take a long time and cause them to have to wait at home for the bus, and then in the hospital for their treatment. The service also helps to take the pressure from Ward 19 at Heartlands Hospital and the Day Unit at Solihull Hospital."

Charlotte: "Often these patients have other carers who come into the home, so their treatment would need to be organised around this. Also, as there are just two of us, we can offer great continuity of care as the



patients do not have to get to know a new nurse each time. The patients have our phone numbers so they can call us if they have any problems. so it's great for them. Another key aspect is infection. Our patients often have a very weak immune system, so spending time in a waiting room with lots of other people puts them at risk of infection. By being at home, they minimise their infection risk."

Your posts are funded by **Heartlands Hospital Charity**, if someone was considering donating to the Charity, what would you tell them?

Harley: "Having a cancer diagnosis is a traumatising and stressful time for anyone, our service allows them to stay at home where they are most comfortable. Instead of having to go to the clinic for 7 days in a row, they can be at home, eating and sleeping as they normally would."



Charlotte: "Thanks to the support of Heartlands Hospital Charity, we are able to make life easier for cancer patients across the region. Your continued support will allow us to continue the service that we provide for our patients."

5 minutes with... Paediatric Unit Health Play Specialist

We spent five minutes catching up with Christine Morrell, a **Play Specialist at Heartlands** Hospital, to get to know more about what her job entails.

Hi Christine, can you tell me a little bit about your job and what you do at Heartlands Hospital?

I work on the Paediatric Unit as a Health Play Specialist. Health Play Specialists work as part of the multidisciplinary team providing play as a therapeutic tool for children and young people who are in hospital. As a play service, we work across sites providing play from 7:30am until 8:00pm. I work alongside fantastic nursery nurses and have enjoyed the job I do for 30 years now.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

I enjoy arranging for visitors to come in and see the children and young people, as hospital can be very boring for not only the children, but the parents as well. It helps to give the children some normality and something to look forward to.

How does the Charity make a difference to your job?

We were able to put on a pantomime for the regular patients at the hospital and have a magician and balloon modeller in for the children. This wouldn't have been possible without the fantastic work that the hospital charity does. They were able to provide the funding for the pantomime and also provide selection boxes for the children. The Charity has been very supportive of the play team and is currently fundraising to improve the children's areas of the hospital, including the Children's Outpatients Department. The refurbishment will be great for the children and will make the area



brighter and all of the new games and play areas will be a distraction for them during appointments.

What do you do in your spare time?

In my spare time I enjoy watching Birmingham City Football Club, and I have two grandchildren who keep me extremely busy! I also have family in Yorkshire and Devon so I like to visit them and do lots of walking.

What would you say to anyone who is thinking about fundraising for Good Hope Hospital Charity?

If anyone is thinking of fundraising for the Paediatric Unit, please do.

Every penny makes a difference to the children and goes towards providing welcome distraction from what can be a very boring and distressing time.

Help us support ne Heartland

Heartlands Hospital Charity is launching a new £150,000 appeal to bring seven state-of-the-art incubators and omnibeds to the Neonatal Unit which will provide the very best care for the smallest patients at the hospital.

Each year, over 11,000 babies are born at Heartlands Hospital and Good Hope Hospital, and over 800 babies will require the support of the Neonatal Unit. The unit provides care for newborn babies and offers a welcoming and friendly environment for parents and families in their time of need. Some babies are born up to four months early, and can weigh as little as one pound. These tiny babies require intensive care and support, and are cared for aroundthe-clock.

Heartlands Hospital Charity is proud to support the incredible work of the staff on the unit by providing the very best equipment possible, helping them to care for the vulnerable newborns on the unit. The new incubators and omnibeds will include all of the equipment





that the staff need to treat tiny babies, removing the stress of moving them from bed to bed in such a critical environment.

The incubators will allow much easier access to the baby for the nurses and mothers, without causing any heat loss. The incubators are also able to cool the baby, as some premature babies need specialist therapeutic hypothermia to reduce the likelihood of a brain injury. Currently, babies who need this treatment have to be transferred to another hospital.

Bhavna Gokani, Head Nurse in the Paediatrics Department at Heartlands Hospital, said: "The new incubators would make a huge difference to the babies that we treat, their families, and the staff on the unit. This new equipment would make the

Neonatal Unit a world-class facility, right here at Heartlands Hospital. "The Trust provides over 20,000 days of neonatal care every year. This shows the huge number of lives that would be changed by this new equipment. Heartlands Hospital receives premature babies from across the region,

from hospitals that do not have the facilities that we do. "With the help of the Charity's supporters, we will be able to

provide the very best care for the tiny, vulnerable babies on the unit. These incubators won't just keep the baby warm, but they provide food and oxygen whilst protecting them from the outside world whilst they grow to a size that will

allow them to survive and thrive."

Hope and Amber's Story

The new incubators will help to treat babies just like Hope and Amber, who were born on the **Neonatal Unit at Heartlands** Hospital in 2010 and are now healthy and happy eight year

Speaking of their birth, Amber and Hope's dad, Julian, said: "After 23 weeks and five days my wife Tracey's waters broke. She called the midwife and was told to get to hospital immediately."

"We knew really that there really wasn't much hope that they were going to survive."

Tracey said: "We were told that they don't necessarily resuscitate children born before 24 weeks. I was told that if I went into labour



immediately that there would be pretty much nothing that could be done to keep Hope and Amber alive."

Amazingly, Tracey didn't go into labour until 26 weeks, and she gave birth to Amber and Hope at Heartlands Hospital. Julian said: "I remember Hope coming out and her head was black, then Amber



came 20 minutes later and she wasn't breathing.

"The doctor had a straw which he popped in her mouth which he was breathing through and you could see her chest going up and down then she was into the incubator."

Despite the incredible work of the staff on the unit, Tracey and Julian were not confident of their babies' chances. "We knew really that there really wasn't much hope that they were going to survive." Tracey said.

However, with each passing day their hope grew. Julian said: "Going in every day we knew that the chances of them surviving were going up."

Eventually, Hope and Amber were able to go home. Tracey said: "The first three years were really tough, but it was just amazing that they were here and growing into happy, healthy children."

Julian said: "Amber has mild cerebral palsy, and we didn't know if she was going to be able to walk or talk. Now, she doesn't stop! You hear them reading to each other and laughing and you think 'wow,

we never expected to get to that stage."

Reflecting on the work of the Neonatal Unit, Tracey said: "We've been so lucky; the Neonatal Unit is an amazing place. If the nurses were here now I'd sav what I've said to them before, and that's thank you so much for all that you did. For looking after us and our children, without them we wouldn't have made it."

Neomatal

In this issue we are celebrating some of the incredible people who have raised money to support the Neonatal Unit at Heartlands Hospital. Many of these charity champs have experienced the life-saving work of the unit, and the money that they have raised will help to save even more newborns in need.

Nine fundraisers run for unit that saved baby's life

Bethan and Tom Odey's baby boy, Benjamin, was born 12 weeks early, weighing just 3lbs 1oz and spending his first five weeks of life on the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

Whilst on the unit, Benjamin was ventilated and then on oxygen for four weeks before having to learn to breathe on his own and how to feed.

Bethan, said: "He came home on 7 February 2018 and he is now a happy and healthy baby and this is all down to the dedication of the staff at Heartlands and Good Hope."

Bethan and Tom wanted to raise money for the Neonatal Unit at Heartlands, and have so far raised an incredible £4,493. A group of nine fundraisers, including Tom, completed the Birmingham half marathon to raise money for the unit.



A heartfelt donation for Heartlands Hospital Charity

Jessica and James Mitchell's daughter, Margot, was born at Heartlands Hospital three months prematurely, weighing a tiny 1lb and 10oz.

After Margot's birth, she spent three months in hospital being closely monitored in both critical and special care. Margot was eventually discharged from hospital on her due date, with the help of oxygen set up at home to support her little lungs and regular visits from the neonatal community outreach team.

Her parents were taught by the medical team how to care for Margot at home, learning new skills such as taking her temperature, tube feeding and changing a nappy without disturbing the wires surrounding her. Jessica said: "James and I had 24/7 access and could also ring up at any time. The staff got to know Margot

and us as a family on a personal level and also included us in every decision made for her care. Every diagnosis, treatment and medication was discussed in great detail."

Saturday 17 November marked World Prematurity Day, inspiring the couple to raise funds to give back to the ward that cared for their little girl.

James said: "Heartlands NICU and all the staff within the unit saved our daughter and gave us the chance to become a family. I don't know how we could ever repay them for what they have done for us. It's been a tough journey, one I am glad Margot will not remember but one we certainly will never forget. They will always have a special place in our hearts! Thank vou."



The couple raised an incredible £1.219 for the neonatal unit which will help to provide 'added extras' for the babies who are treated there.

Fundraising family continue their charity efforts

Stechford Mobility, a Birmingham based company, has raised an incredible £7,214 for the Neonatal Unit at Heartlands Hospital.

The inspiration for the partnership came when Martyn Thomas, whose father David is the Managing Director of Stechford Mobility, spent time on the unit following the premature birth of his daughter Lyla. Lyla spent four weeks being treated on the Neonatal Unit, and Martyn and his wife Hannah were so impressed with the care that they received that they wanted to give something back.

The fundraising family and their friends and colleagues have already raised over £7,000 having taken on a number of very different challenges.

Martyn set himself a challenge along with his sister-in-law Amy of completing four Wolf Runs, a 10km run with extreme obstacles, one in each season of the year.

Martyn's father David, along with a group of friends, decided to ride their Vespa scooters all the way from Birmingham to Edinburgh! Setting off at 5am on a sunny July weekend, the team made it to Edinburgh by 3pm.

Despite being

only three years old, Lyla has taken on a fundraising event of her own. Along with her mum Hannah, she walked two miles around Castle Vale as part of the Mini's First Miles event that was organised by Stacey Shaw, Senior Ward Sister on the Neonatal

Unit. The event saw parents and their babies and toddlers who had been born on the unit take on the two mile walk to raise funds for the unit. Stacey said: "Despite the rainy weather, the walkers had a great time and raised a fantastic amount of money."



Charity ball raises funds for Neonatal Unit

Siobhan Devlin decided to hold a charity fundraising ball for the Neonatal Unit at Heartlands Hospital after both of her sons were treated there after being born at 35 and 36 weeks.

The mother-of-two joined up with her colleagues from Lloyds Bank to hold a Charity Ball at the Park Regis Hotel which raised a huge £3,200 for the Neonatal Unit! Lloyds Bank made a donation of £2,500 to support Siobhan's fundraising, taking her total to an incredible £5,700.

Siobhan said: "I'm really happy that we managed to raise so much for the unit as both of my boys were supported by the unit as they were born prematurely. I know the strength it takes for the parents and



families of premature babies to deal with the situation."

Siobhan wants to continue supporting the babies, families and staff at the hospital over the next year and is hoping to reach her huge fundraising target of £10,000!

The Eden Suite at Heartlands Hospital is a dedicated bereavement suite which cares for women who sadly lose their baby through miscarriage, stillbirth or neonatal death. The unit provides a peaceful and private environment for parents in their time of need.



The Eden Suite offers the best care possible for women and their families and the experienced. highly-trained staff are always on hand to support through their time on the suite, and continue to provide care after they leave hospital.

Heartlands Hospital Charity works alongside the incredible staff on the Eden Suite to provide the best possible care for parents. There is a quiet room on the unit, which is used as a non-clinical space, where parents can speak to members of staff, or sit and reflect on their own or with family members.

This space has been refurbished thanks to funds raised for the Eden Suite, and the quiet room is now much bigger, and has been filled with beautiful, non-clinical furniture, which has created a calm and tranquil space for parents to spend

time with each other, or with other family members.

Talking about the project, Clare Beesley, Bereavement Midwife, said: "This new delivery suite will be invaluable to mothers who sadly lose their baby due to neonatal death, miscarriage or stillbirth. Our bereavement services are used every week and we strive to give the best possible care, this new delivery room will help them achieve that and give families privacy during such a devastating

"Mothers will not be the only ones affected by this refurbishment, partners, siblings and other family members will also benefit from the new suite as it will give them a chance to spend time together and come to terms with their loss." Sian Averill, Fundraising Manager at Heartlands Hospital Charity,

said: "The Charity is delighted to have been able to fund this refurbishment. The new quiet room is a beautiful space, and will be of benefit to all of the parents who need the expert services of the Eden Suite.

"The Charity is immensely grateful to all of the incredible fundraisers who have managed to make this renovation possible. Many of the families who are treated on the Eden Suite go on to raise money to support the services that the unit provides.

Fundraiser completes 10km run in memory of


his dad

Rhys was diagnosed with autoimmune neutropenia (AIN), a condition that is most common amongst infants and young children. The body identifies the white blood cells as enemies and makes antibodies to attack them, as a result this reduced Rhys's immune system.

The fundraising family and friends known as 'Rhys's Helping Hand' raised the money by hosting a car wash and bake sale selling yummy cakes, brownies and for those who don't have a sweet tooth, delicious sandwiches.
