



Pets in Hospital turns one

The Pets in Hospital scheme has turned turned one year old, and we are celebrating an incredible 12 months of the dogs visiting patients and staff to brighten up their days.

Since launching in July 2018, our dogs have been visiting patients as much as they can to bring a smile to their face during what can be a really difficult time.

The dogs were brought to the hospital to show that animals can have a positive impact on improving patient wellbeing. So far, dogs like ours have been shown to reduce anxiety, help reduce the perceived level of pain experienced by a patient through distraction therapy, and promote a calm and positive working environment for staff.

Jo Latimer, who owns Monty, has visited patients many times since the scheme began and said: "I absolutely love bringing Monty to the hospital. To



see the smiles on the faces of patients that we visit is so heart-warming. Being a Pets in Hospital volunteer is great fun, and Monty loves the attention that he gets!"

After dog visits we receive feedback forms from staff members about how

their visit has gone, one staff member said: "We've seen extremely positive effects from the dogs on our patients, they put a big smile on their faces."

The scheme was originally launched on the older people's wards at QEHB, but has now expanded across the hospital so even more patients have the benefit of a Pets in Hospital visit.



Ellie Pocock, who coordinates the service, said: The scheme has been incredibly successful over the past year and we can't wait to see how else we can improve it."

"We get such amazing feedback from staff on wards and even the patients who have had a visit from a dog. It really does brighten up their day and gives them something to look forward to whilst they're in hospital.

Lieutenant Colonel Mark Foster Surgeon at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham

We spent five minutes catching up with Lieutenant Mark Foster, a surgeon at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham who specialises in treating patients who have severe injuries to their hands. Mark is taking on the Marathon Des Sables, a 156 mile run across the Sahara Desert, to raise money for Fisher House.

Hi Mark, what does your job involve?

Hello, I work as a surgeon at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham, as a specialist in plastic surgery and reconstruction, specialising in hands. I work within the Royal Centre for Defence Medicine at the hospital. I experienced treating the injured troops as they returned home from the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan, often with severe injuries as the result of explosions.

So what is the Marathon Des Sables?

The Marathon Des Sables is an ultramarathon that sees participants take on a 156 mile run over the course of



six days, across the Sahara Desert, finishing in Marrakesh, Morocco. It's even tougher than it sounds as you have to carry all of your clothes, food and bedding with you as you go. The toughest day is the equivalent of running two marathons. It's going to be 40-50°C during the day in the desert so that's the biggest challenge.

So what made you want to take on this challenge?

I wanted to take on a challenge in my fiftieth year, I've never run a marathon before but I have done half marathon distances with weight on whilst in the military! I wanted to raise money for Fisher House (the home away from home for military patients and their families at QEHB) as I've seen it since its inception and it's a massive resource for the families and serving individuals who have to travel long distances.

It's a unique environment and has such a family community feel. I have many patients, particularly upper arm and nerve patients, who return regularly to the hospital for treatment, and they're able to stay at Fisher House.

What difference does Fisher House make to those who stay there?

Having been in the army since I was 16, I directly see the amazing benefit of Fisher House and the incredible support it can offer. It is amazing to see patients that return for treatment be able to stay in the house. It reduces stress for them and their family and it's just a short walk from the hospital.



How do you think that you'll be able to keep going throughout the Marathon Des Sables?

It's a mental as well as a physical challenge, it's your own dogged determination to drive you through that will see me finish the race. This challenge will prove to myself that I can do something incredibly challenging from a physical and mental capacity.

Inspirational primary school teacher raises over £3,000 for QEHB Charity

Primary school teacher Ryan Wayne, 26, was enjoying an evening out with friends in Birmingham City Centre when he was attacked, stabbed twice and left fighting for his life on the pavement.



Ryan spent the next week in a coma, and spent the following months slowly recovering his strength after this horrendous ordeal. He said: "The hardest part wasn't the wounds or the pain. It was seeing my mum, dad and sisters so upset.

It was gut-wrenching, but the care I received was absolutely incredible."

Whilst Ryan was still in hospital, his best friend Craig Butler decided to start a fundraising campaign for the Mobile CT Scanner at QEHB.

Thanks to the generosity of their friends, Craig raised a fantastic £1,162 to help towards funding a new Mobile CT Scanner which will change the way that patients with brain injuries are scanned at the hospital.

Ryan decided to hold a charity walk to raise funds for the hospital that saved his life, as well as knife crime charity Ben Kinsella Trust.

The idea for the Lichfield Walk for Awareness was born, and Ryan decided to walk over 18 miles from Lichfield City Centre to QEHB, accompanied by friends and family.

The walk raised an incredible £3,461 for QEHB Charity, and Ryan and his friends and family celebrated with a cheque presentation at the hospital.

Man completes epic 50km run inspired by his dad

Darroch Reid of Quinton, Birmingham, completed a 50km run to raise money to support the Critical Care Department at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham where his father had been treated. Thanks to his friends and family, Darroch raised an incredible £1,042 for the Critical Care Department at the hospital.



Darroch's father,
Kenneth,
was admitted to hospital in June following a blood clot in his bowel, and has spent a long time in Critical Care.
Darroch

said: "It's been really humbling to have received so much support from people who know dad, who know me, or who know the hospital and have wanted to support my fundraising. They have all given so much support and I'm really pleased to have raised so much."

Family take on skydive to raise money for Lymphoma fund

Gita Devlia, along with her nephews Shailen and Jay, took to the skies and raised an amazing £2,102 for the Lymphoma Fund at



QEHB. The family trio took on a skydive at the Hinton Airfield in Oxfordshire and were surrounded by their friends and family as they completed their challenge. The family had a special reason to raise money for this fund, as Gita has been treated at the hospital for Lymphoma since she was diagnosed in 2012.

She said: "I live with Lymphoma and the hospital have been very good to me since I was diagnosed in 2012. I have received treatment constantly since then, as my immune system is very depleted. I wanted to give something back to the hospital." Reflecting on her fundraising experience, Gita said: "It was incredible, I enjoyed the view so much and it really does feel like you are flying."



Dad runs first half marathon for home from home



Rob Hilton's son was diagnosed with a brain tumour at the same time that his wife was diagnosed with breast cancer. Rob said: "I was frequently travelling the 120-mile round trip between my son's bedside, and my wife at home."

After being on his son's ward, Rob found out about SACA's home away from home which was created to help house families when their children are being treated

for cancer at the hospital. Rob ended up staying at the home from home for almost an entire month whilst his son received treatment. SACA's home away from home provides a place for families to stay, just a five minute walk from the hospital where their loved ones are being treated. Families can use the home, free of charge, for any length of time, enabling them to remain close to their children whilst they are being treated.

To say thank you for the help that he received, Rob raised an incredible £4,014 for QEHB Charity by running the half marathon in Ilkley!

Talking about staying in the home from home, Rob said: "Somewhere to call our Birmingham home took away so much anxiety and enabled us to rest between treatments and visits to Birmingham so I just wanted to say thank you for that.

"My family and I have been completely overwhelmed by the kindness and generous support of our friends and family, we hope the money raised will benefit other families like ours."

Stourbridge man takes to the skies in memory of his wife

Lorraine West was brought to QEHB with lumps in the left-hand side of her head that were pressing on her brain. She was treated in the Centre for Rare Diseases before passing away and now her husband Nick has raised an incredible amount of money for the hospital charity.

After Lorraine passed away in March 2018, Nick felt like he needed to do something to thank the staff in the Centre for Rare Diseases for all of their



care and hard work whilst Lorraine was in hospital.

She was admitted in September 2017 and Nick said: "I basically watched her die over six months. She couldn't get off the bed, she was fed with a tube and the only thing she said of a night when I visited was 'help me'.

"I visited every single day whilst she was in hospital and never missed one, and I didn't even have a day off work."

The lumps in Lorraine's head were pressing on her brain which caused her to have a brain stem stroke. It was difficult to help her as her condition was so rare there was little knowledge on it at the time.

Nick took on a skydive in Lorraine's memory and jumped 15,000ft out of a plane in a tandem skydive

on what would have been their 23rd wedding anniversary. He raised an incredible £1,750.50 for the Centre for Rare Diseases!

Nearly two years on from his accident, Matt held a fundraising dinner which saw seven Michelin starred chefs come together to put on a dinner like no other. The chefs, Tom Brown, Glynn Purnell, Luke Tipping, Jonathan Howe, Aktar Islam, Adam Bennett and Andreas Antona, put on a dazzling evening of food at University College Birmingham to raise money for Matt's chosen charities,

QEHB Charity, Mind, Hospitality Action and University Hospitals of North Midlands Charity.

The evening raised an incredible £8,000, of which £4,000 was donated to QEHB Charity.


For many of the participants it was their first experience of a closed-road cycling event, and being part of the 1,000-strong QEHB Charity team helped to spur them on to complete the challenge.

BHBN Hospital Radio holds 24-hour Charity Radiothon

BHBN Hospital Radio, based at QEHB, held a 24-hour Charity Radiothon to raise funds for the radio itself and for the hospital charity. The team raised an incredible £217 after 24 hours of broadcasting live to patients around the hospitals.



The broadcast started at 9am on Friday 5 July, in conjunction with the NHS's birthday, and ended at 9am on Saturday 6 July. The team were also celebrating their 'Station of the Year' award at this year's National Hospital Broadcasting Association Awards.

BHBN's Vice Chairman, Dave Horton, said: "We're really pleased that the Radiothon was a success in raising money for the hospital charity as well as increasing awareness about the service BHBN provides.

"We had lots of patients ringing up throughout the day for requests, there was great feedback from people who visited our stall in QEHB's Atrium, and some of the hospital staff even came to tour our studios!"

Doctors cycle to raise money for Haemophilia patients

Doctor Smita Sinha and her team have taken on a static bike ride in the hospital to raise money for the West Midlands Adult Haemophilia Unit.

The team, including consultants, nurses and secretaries, cycled for 12 hours in the main atrium of the hospital to

raise awareness of the genetic disorder and to raise money for the patients who are treated here at the hospital for it.

Haemophilia is mostly an inherited genetic disorder that means the body can't make blood clots that are needed to stop bleeding. People who suffer from



this will experience longer bleeding after an injury, easy bruising and an increased risk of bleeding inside joints or

Talking about the bike ride, Smita said: "The cycle went really well. I was really proud of my teams who stepped up to do 30-60 minute slots on the static bikes.

"Along with consultants, nurses and secretaries, we were joined by Gareth Duncan and Kaz Smith who are ex-military and are also joining me in future fundraising challenges!

The team raised an incredible £598.28 which will be split between the West Midlands Adult Haemophilia Unit and Unicef.

HIV Team take on 10km to raise funds

A group of colleagues from the HIV team at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham took on a 10km run to raise money to support their patients. The group decided to take on the 10km run as it proved a physical challenge and gave them the chance to spend some time together outside of work.

The team were led by Satwant Kaur, who said: "We wanted to get everyone together and bond as a team whilst raising money for our patients." Speaking of the work that the HIV team do, Satwant said: "As a team we have a lot of specialities, we are made up of health advisors, specialist nurses, pharmacists, health care assistants and social workers. Everyone plays a really big part in looking after our patients with HIV on a day-to-day basis."

Thousands of liver transplant patients, their families and staff members joined us for a day of fun to celebrate the 5,000th liver transplant taking place at QEHB. Thamara Perera is one of the Liver Surgeons at QEHB and Birmingham

life and are now actively working and contributing to society and that's the whole idea of organ transplantation. I am sure the donor families would be so happy to know that the greatest gift of life from their beloved ones has made a significant change in a patient's

One of these who wanted to thank Mr Perera for all of his work and care in his journey was Patrick Dunn who said: "I had my liver transplant four years ago and I wouldn't be here if it wasn't for Mr Perera. I pop in to see the liver team to say hello sometimes, they are fantastic, each and every one of them."

Another patient who attended the event was Gemma Jolly who received her successful liver transplant in 2018 thanks to the new OrganOx machine, funded by the Ann Fox Foundation who fundraise in memory of Ann who passed away after a transplant. Gemma was diagnosed with auto-immune hepatitis in 1997 and after the birth of her two children in 2001 and 2006, her liver began to fail.

The OrganOx machine helps to clean a donated liver ready for transplantation which increases the chances of the recipient's body accepting the new liver, and therefore increasing the number of organs that will be considered for a transplant.

Gemma said: "Before I went into surgery, Mr Perera told me that if it wasn't for the machine then I wouldn't have been able to have that liver as they wouldn't have considered it to be suitable."

The celebration raised a spectacular £2,317 for the Liver Foundation here within the hospital charity which will go towards providing added extras that go over and above what the NHS can fund.

Justine Davy, Head of Fundraising for QEHB Charity, said: "The event was such a wonderful occasion and



went down so well with everyone. I would like to thank each and every person that attended the event and those that helped to make it special.

"The money raised on the day will go towards supporting liver patients at QEHB by funding research, equipment and facilities over and above what the NHS can provide."

A life-saving £325,000 appeal has been launched for critically ill patients at the hospital who need CT scans during their admission.

Each year, hundreds of patients need to be moved from the Critical Care Unit to the Radiology Department whenever they need a CT scan, and this can often be several times within the same admission.

The new Mobile CT Scanner will allow patients with severe head injuries to receive life-saving CT scans without having to leave the Critical Care Unit.

For many patients at QEHB, especially those who have suffered major head trauma, the transfer between Critical Care and Radiology is not a journey done without risk. These patients need to be disconnected from ventilators and bedside monitoring, laid flat and then transported two floors down for the scan. When the scan is complete.

the process happens

in reverse back up to

their bed on Critical Care.

Some patients who are in a severely unstable condition can miss out on these scans all together as the risks associated with the transport are too high for their injuries.

The portable CT scanner will allow radiographers to perform urgent scans for critically injured patients at their bedsides. Patients who need a CT scan are normally at their most vulnerable and unstable

and are more than likely relying on ventilators and monitoring equipment.

Although staff that look after these patients are highly skilled, any movement of a critically ill patient carries a risk.

The new CT scanner will allow crucial treatment to reach them sooner, not only potentially saving their lives, but improving

> their quality of life post-surgery as head injuries can cause life-long disabilities if the brain sustains

> > permanent damage.

Justine Davy, Head of Fundraising for QEHB Charity, said: "This new appeal will help us to bring a piece of life-saving equipment to the Critical Care Unit. A lot of patients who are treated here need at least one CT scan during their admission, but the movement from Critical

Mum needed a scan after her 13 and a half hour operation and had to be sedated to be moved. having this new scanner on the ward would be such a help for patients and less disruptive."

As well as the skydive, Claire and Pippa gathered their friends and family to fundraise for the appeal too with the local pub, The Bell Inn in Leominster, holding a darts match, and Claire's dad selling football cards. They all raised an incredible £1,845.70 for the appeal which will help so many patients receive their CT scans at their bedside in the future.

Team Lewis

A group of 13 members from the Lewis family took part in a Gung-Ho challenge in Cofton Park to raise money for the Mobile CT Scanner appeal. Kevin Lewis was treated for cancer at QEHB and spent some of his time on the Critical Care Unit before sadly passing away.

During the eight weeks in hospital, he spent four weeks on Critical Care and needed to have multiple CT scans done so had to be unplugged from ventilators and monitoring equipment to be taken down to Radiology for them to be completed.

Kevin's daughter, Hannah, was at the forefront of the fundraising and said: "When my dad had to be taken down for his scan, it was like a military operation. He had about three stands of drips, his life support machine and then there was him and well. It really hard."

The team raised an incredible £1,000 for the Mobile CT Scanner appeal in memory of Kevin and hope to take on even more fundraising challenges to raise more money.

The challenge involved a 5k race and 11 obstacle courses where the team had to jump through holes, go over and under things and climb huge walls to make their way around.





Rob cycles 400 miles for Lymphoma patients at QEHB

Ruth and Ed were originally supposed to get married on 4 June 2018 but decided to move the date when she was put on the transplant list to give them more time to plan it, at their wedding this year they raised an incredible £1,280 for the Liver Unit!
