

Supporting patients with dementia

QEHB Charity is proud to be supporting patients with dementia by bringing interactive software units to wards throughout the hospital - but we couldn't do it without the generous support of various companies and community groups who have donated to the **Elderly Care appeal.**

QEHB Charity is seeking to help to provide comfort and support for patients with dementia, not

QEHB Charity has already been able to deliver several units to wards around the hospital that most frequently care for patients with dementia, making a tangible difference to the quality of care that staff are able to deliver to these patients.

Now, the Charity is asking for companies, groups and individuals to support the campaign and help raise a total of £20,000 to fund more units for wards at QEHB. Each

> MyLife Software unit costs £1.500. Mike Hammond. Chief Executive at QEHB Charity, said: "A stay in hospital for a person living with dementia can be a confusing and potentially frightening experience. The MyLife

Software has

been developed by carers to help patients with dementia communicate and interact with staff and loved ones - they are so valuable to wards at QEHB and the patients being treated there.

"While we have a couple of wards at the hospital that specialise in the treatment of elderly patients. many of whom have dementia, the reality is that people with dementia can be admitted to hospital with any condition or injury, meaning frequently they will be staying on a ward that does not specialise in dementia and may be the only person on that ward with the condition.



"Because of this, we want to provide MyLife units across many wards at the hospital, and that's why we are asking businesses and community groups to support our Elderly Care appeal by donating £1.500."



just on the wards specifically dedicated to elderly care, but wherever in the hospital they may be receiving treatment. The MvLife Software units consist of special touchscreen monitors which patients can use to play games, view popular video clips from days gone by, and create personal interactive 'life stories', using the patient's own photos, with the help of staff and families. The units also include a useful 'hear me' function to help patients who may struggle with verbal communication to speak to staff. They are lightweight and portable, making it easy to take the software to the patient.

Dave Watson

Fisher House resident and Patient Advocate

We caught up with Dave Watson, Fisher House resident and Patient Advocate at QEHB Charity, as he spoke to us about life in the army and fatherhood...

What did you do before joining the army?

After leaving school I became a bricklayer for three years. I enjoyed playing lots of football and fishing in my spare time. Despite always having wanted to join the army since I left school. I decided that it would be best to have a trade to 'fall back on' if life in the army didn't prove to be as good as I hoped it would be.

What was life like during the army?

It was amazing. I loved travelling the world and meeting people who eventually became like a second family. The support and teaching I received from the army was amazing.

How were you injured?

During a routine mission, I was getting into a stream to walk through it, when I passed an Improvised Explosive Device (IED). When one of my friends fell behind, I went to help him, but stepped on the IED and fell into the water. Unable to bring my head above the surface and with lights flashing before my eyes, I lost both legs and my right arm in the blast, and was flown back to the UK for treatment.

How is Fisher House making a difference for military patients?

I believe that Fisher House is instrumental to both patient and family recovery. Because all military personnel that are injured or fall ill are treated in

Birmingham, they are coming from across the country; Fisher House takes away the extra panic of finding somewhere to stay, and it is comforting to know that, if your condition was to take a turn for the worse, your family would be at your bedside in little over five minutes. I know that it would have been a great comfort for me, knowing that my family were able to be right there if I needed them, and that they were being well looked after themselves. The House is a place of support, where families can speak to one another and help each other get through the situations they face - I think it removes the feeling of isolation that many families feel when they first receive the news of their loved one's injury.

How did you find out you were going to become a father?

I have two children: Erin, my daughter, and Josh, my stepson. For a while after the accident I didn't know if I would be able to have biological children. I was at home one morning, considering whether or not to get this checked out, when I received a call from my wife, Becky, to let me know that she was pregnant!

What is fatherhood like?

Since Erin was born, fatherhood has been the best thing that has ever happened to me. I have both Erin and Josh, and I love them both equally. I will do anything to help them; they are my world.



What is the best part of fatherhood?

When I wake up in the morning, and go to fetch Erin from her cot, she is always standing and waiting with a huge smile on her face, her arms outstretched for me to pick her up; it's an amazing feeling.

How old is Erin?

She's seventeen months old and growing up quickly!

Do you want to have more children in the future?

I would like to. I'll have to ask Becky though!





"Every year this event grows in popularity, and we were thrilled that such fantastic comedians were able to give up their time in support of the comedy night, which helped





Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, so look out for our pink atrium stands throughout the month where QEHB Charity and Ladies Fighting Breast Cancer will be collecting together to raise vital funds for patients with breast cancer.

Back in April, the two charities launched a brand new £250,000 mobile mammogram trailer at Broad Meadow Health Centre in Kings Norton, equipped with leading x-ray facilities. The mobile mammogram will be able to offer breast screenings to women out in the community, removing the need to travel to QEHB.

"There are so many reasons that people might not attend, from geography and time restraints through to just plain old fear, but research shows just how important it is to get checked and find these things as early as possible. This screening unit helps make it as convenient as possible for people," said Veronica Kumeta, co-founder of LFBC.

It is estimated that about 60% of people in the UK don't have a will, and most people say that the reason they haven't made a will is simply because they haven't got round to it.

Citizens Advice recommends that everyone makes a will, which allows you to state how your property, money or possessions should be allocated after you die. Partners who have not registered a marriage or civil partnership cannot inherit from each

other without a will, which could cause serious financial problems.

Some people may also want to leave a gift to charity in their will; and last year a staggering £425,000 was donated to QEHB Charity through generous legacies left in wills. These gifts have helped make possible a huge variety of projects across the Charity's appeals, including cutting-edge radiotherapy machine CyberKnife and a teacher for teenagers with cancer.

QEHB Charity has partnered up with The Co-Op Legal Services to offer supporters a discounted will-writing service through the national campaign, Remember a Charity.

The Co-Op Legal Services can carry out everything that is needed to write a will by speaking to you over the phone and sending out the will in the post meaning you can do everything from the comfort of your own home.

You do not have to leave a gift to QEHB Charity in your will, but if you do, we are extremely grateful. Regardless of whether you decide to leave a gift or not, we think it is important that everyone has the opportunity to learn more about a making a will.

Donations fund research into rare liver cancer

Thanks to generous donations to its Liver Foundation UK fund, QEHB Charity has funded a new Research Fellow, Dr Daniel Patten, who is undertaking vital research to help liver patients access treatment before their diseases develop.

Now in-post as a QEHB Charity-funded Research Fellow at the University of Birmingham, Daniel, who lives with his fiancée Amy, has recently started to study a relatively rare form of cancer, known as neuroendocrine tumours [NETs], which often originate in the gut and liver.

He said: "Liver inflammation is a key driving force in all chronic liver diseases; however, the processes involved are still not fully understood. I am currently continuing work on a promising project which has potentially identified a new target for limiting inflammation of the liver and slowing the progression of chronic disease. I have also started working on a new project which aims to increase our knowledge of NETs.

"NETs usually occur in older patients and are typically slow to spread to other parts of the body, so the research world hasn't previously viewed this condition as a priority, compared to more aggressive cancers. Nevertheless, the condition is often very debilitating to the patients and we are trying to increase our scientific knowledge of liver-originating NETs, by finding out what the tumours consist of and which types of cells are present. The end goal is to identify therapeutic targets for patients and to find ways of preventing the tumours from developing."

"I'm very grateful to QEHB Charity for funding my position, and to everyone who has donated to the Liver Foundation. Without their help, I wouldn't be able to support patients with my research. When experiments work and you get to see something that no one has seen before, there is no greater feeling. Added to this is the knowledge that you are one step closer towards benefitting patients whose diseases, before this research, would have been very difficult to treat."





The Birmingham International Marathon comes to the city for the first time on Sunday 15 October 2017, the same day as the half marathon. With your generous donations, QEHB Charity has funded new lights for the Clinical Photography department at QEHB, which has resulted in higher quality images, faster workflow, and fewer waiting times for patients.

Clinical photography is an important part of the clinical pathway for patients at the hospital. The photographers record patients' clinical conditions daily, and use the photographs for diagnosis, or for recording a condition during the various stages of treatment.

Robert MacMillan, Clinical Photography Team Manager, said: "We are incredibly grateful to QEHB Charity for purchasing new studio lights for the Clinical Photography department.

"Because the photos we take are used to record clinical conditions and play an important role in diagnosis, it is very important that our equipment has a high operating standard. In order for us to produce accurate results, the images need to be shot with a very high standard of light. The new lights kindly provided by QEHB Charity are already helping to achieve this, and have guaranteed better accuracy and quality for the future.

"The lights have helped to make our patient area more comfortable as they are a lot cooler than the old lights, which previously reached very high temperatures. They have also improved the accuracy and sharpness of our photographs, and the new flash bulbs have helped to speed up the post-production time, which means there are fewer people waiting to receive news of their condition or diagnosis, and our workflow is much

QEHB Charity has also recently funded a toaster for every ward at QEHB.

Mike Hammond, QEHB Charity Chief Executive, said: "When patients are away from home, it's the simple things which can make a big difference to their hospital experience. Lots of patients were requesting toast and until now, it hasn't been possible to provide this for them.

"The Charity was approached by the Trust's catering team and asked whether funding would be possible - we were very happy to help."







'Added extras' have also been helping to get elderly patients up on their feet, in the form of rock and roll performer Paul Reynoldson, who visited patients on Bournville ward at QEHB on Friday 12 August. The popular performer sang a variety of tunes from the 50s, 60s and 70s, and was funded by your generous donations.

Finally, your donations have helped to buy a specialist machine for liver transplant patients at QEHB.

The new machine, called a Fibroscan, provides a painless, non-invasive analysis of the liver in as little as ten minutes, avoiding the previous need for an intrusive biopsy, which requires patients to stay in hospital overnight.

The innovative equipment can also detect liver damage or disease and, if problems are identified early, treatments can be tailored to the patient, meaning serious liver damage and disease can be avoided.

Involved in fundraising for the £80,000 machine was QEHB staff member Michelle Scandrett. The 46-year-old mum of three and **Applications System Support Officer** at QEHB, organised a fantastic cabaret evening in aid of the Liver Unit at QEHB.

The fundraising fanatic, who has worked at QEHB for over 30 years, decided to support QEHB Charity following the great care she has received following her diagnosis of non-alcoholic fatty liver disease, F3 fibrosis and Gilberts Syndrome.

She said: "The care I received from staff at QEHB was absolutely

fantastic. I am delighted that QEHB Charity has been able to purchase a Fibroscan machine, which will help so many patients. I am pleased I was able to contribute to such a worthy cause and it is so fulfilling to see how my donation will be used."

Charities unite to provide families of blood cancer patients with Karen's Home from Home



When someone you love needs to spend an extended period of time in hospital, often far from home, the last thing you want to have to worry about is where you're going to stay in order to be with them during their treatment. QEHB Charity and the **Karen Morris Memorial Trust have** teamed up to provide the families of patients with blood cancer, such as leukaemia, with freeto-use accommodation a short walk from the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham, opening Karen's Home from Home in 2014.

The Karen Morris Memorial Trust was set up in 1999 to continue the fundraising legacy of Karen Morris, a 23-year-old student at Warwick University, who passed away in September 1998 following a year-long battle with chronic myeloid leukaemia. The KMMT aims to provide Karen's

Homes from Home for leading haematology departments across the UK, with QEHB's (based down the road at Elizabeth Court) being the fourth such home.

Since it opened in December 2014. many patients and their families have benefitted from the facilities. D Houghton, from Stoke on Trent, said of Karen's Home from Home: "I used your apartment in Birmingham when my husband was in the hospital for a stem cell transplant. He had acute myeloid leukaemia. I was in the apartment

for three of the six weeks he was in hospital and it made a great difference - beautiful, wellequipped and, most importantly, close to the hospital."

Sylvia Morris, Karen's mother and chairperson of KMMT, added: "While nothing can ease the pain of losing my Karen, feedback from users of our facilities really is a source of encouragement and strength for our work to continue Karen's legacy."

Loving widower continues to raise money for liver patients

Tony Fox, loving husband to Ann Fox, a patient at QEHB who tragically passed away in 2014 after spending over two decades battling liver disease, has raised more than £21,000 for the hospital's Liver department, in memory of his wife.

The money kindly donated by Tony and his family, will be used to fund a Normothermic Regional Perfusion machine (NRP), which keeps the liver, pancreas and kidneys 'alive' for longer, increasing the number of potential organ donors and improving the likelihood of a successful transplant.



The NRP machine at QEHB has been renamed the 'Fox Machine', in memory of both Ann's life and Tony's persistent fundraising over the past two years.

Memorial Trust supports military families



Lt Dougie Dalzell MC Memorial Trust (DDMT) officially launched its £10,000 sponsorship of a room in Fisher House, a 'home away from home' for military patients and their families.

DMMT was established in 2011 by the friends and family of Lieutenant Dougie Dalzell MC who lost his life in Afghanistan in 2010. Dougie

died as a result of an IED explosion in the Babji area of Nahr-e-Saraj in central Helmand during an operation to clear insurgents so that a checkpoint could be built and a road laid through the area. Developments like these have brought enduring security to the local Afghan people.

Now, in Dougie's name, DMMT aims to improve the quality of life for soldiers throughout the British Armed Forces, by promoting the health and circumstance of service people and veterans, supporting dependants and awarding grants to military charities like Fisher House. The Trust decided to name the room they are sponsoring the Thurlestone Room, after a village in Devon, where Dougie spent many happy holidays with his family.

Tricia Morris, Trust Secretary at DDMT, said: "The Trustees of the Lt Dougie Dalzell MC Memorial Trust were impressed to learn of the work and care that takes place at Fisher House and are absolutely delighted to support this welcoming 'home away from home' for military patients and their families."


Kind-hearted schoolgirl raises money for stroke patients
