Mobile Dental Unit

The hospital charity is currently appealing for a major £115,000 project, the Mobile Dental Unit. It's no secret that the dentist can often be a scary place; mostly due to the unnerving experiences we have had as children. This appeal will see a change in the way that children view the dentist, making it less daunting and significantly improving their oral hygiene.

The Solihull Hospital community dental team currently visit schools around the Solihull borough to ensure that children with the highest levels of tooth decay and the lowest attendance rates with local dentists still receive the best dental care possible.

Solihull Hospital Charity is raising money to fund a brand new unit for the team. This service will offer dental advice, examinations and treatments to children at primary schools in the most deprived areas of the Solihull borough.

The new unit will have the best dental equipment, and has been designed to suit the needs of children with learning difficulties as well as being wheelchair-friendly.

Children with more complex needs such as children on the autistic spectrum (ASD) face the same challenges that other children do when it comes to oral health. However, the challenges can be largely magnified due to sensory processing difficulties. Such children are highly anxious and exhibit behavioural reactions when exposed to a clinical dental environment such as the bright fluorescent lights, touching in or around the mouth and the taste and smell of various utensils can all be very scary for someone with ASD.

The new unit will have sensory items that will calm the young patients, making them feel as comfortable as possible, helping to make the unit feel less clinical.

Examples of the sensory items that we hope to provide include:



A projector/TV screen in the unit to act as a visual distraction for when children are waiting to be examined.



Video goggles to protect the eyes and distract the patients during a dental examination.



A local anaesthetic wand which is a computercontrolled dental injection. The flow rate of the local anaesthetic is controlled by a computer meaning that it is guaranteed to be slow and steady therefore reducing pain and fear for all our young patients.

For many children in Solihull, access to dental surgeries can often be difficult. For children with complex needs, access to treatment can be even harder. With the aid of the unit, this will no longer be an issue. The unit will be readily available for children and will aim to educate them at an early age on how to prevent loss of teeth and extensive tooth decay. The unit will be on school sites, minimising time spent out of school.

With the help of your donations, the Solihull Hospital community dentists will have access to a modernised mobile dental unit that suits the needs of their younger patients. It will enable children, especially those with complex needs, to be treated as comfortably and as smoothly as possible. This will help to improve the oral health of children across the area, and reduce their anxieties around dental health for the rest of their lives.

We spent five minutes catching up with Denise Pickford, who is a Heath Care Assistant and Ward Clerk at Solihull Hospital, to find out what her job involves!

Hi Denise, what is your role at **Solihull Hospital?**

Hi there. I am the Heath Care Assistant and Ward Clerk for Solihull Hospital's Acute Medical Unit (AMU). I have been doing this role for around 23 years now... a very long time! Prior to working for Solihull Hospital I worked at a nursing home and then wanted to join the NHS health sector and help people.

Your role must be challenging at times, can you tell us a little bit about what you do day to day?

On a day to day basis I will help to assist the qualified nurses on duty. From an admin perspective I will often work on the reception desks, booking in ambulances and dealing with patients and relatives as well as medical professionals. It can be quite stressful at times but I always aim to have a good rapport with every single person that comes in and out of the Acute Medial Unit.

What do you enjoy most about your job, Denise?

Probably getting to know patients and relatives, as we are an assessment unit, we don't get much time with patients before they are taken to a ward. In the short time that they are here I really enjoy sitting and chatting to them about their life.

What do you do when you aren't at

I'm a full time Mom... I work long hours so once I'm home I dedicate all my attention to my kids, it really is a full time job.

When you were growing up, did you always want to work within the healthcare services, and if so why?

Yes, I always have. I have done nothing else career-wise, I have such a strong passion for my job and I couldn't imagine doing anything else. I have worked with a wide range of patients, from elderly people to children with learning difficulties. I love the feeling of giving something back and having the ability to make someone's day however big or small.

How has Solihull Hospital Charity helped both staff and patients on AMU?

Potentially life-saving equipment has been kindly provided by Solihull Hospital Charity when we needed it most. The equipment on the unit is a huge help for both staff and patients, we are an extremely busy unit, we also maintain resus too so our equipment is constantly being used.

What would you like to say to the **fundraisers who support Solihull Hospital Charity?**

I would like to say a huge thank you to everyone who donates to such a worthy cause, with your support the Charity will be able to provide our patients with the things that the NHS cannot provide. The hospital charity's elderly care appeal is raising money to bring specialist enter activities, to the elderly car

Solihull Hospital treats over 4,000 patients every year who are elderly or have dementia. The hospital has two elderly care wards dedicated to caring for elderly patients and patients with dementia. There is also a specialist team of nurses, doctors, occupational therapists, speech and language therapists, physiotherapists and dieticians available to ensure they have access to the best care possible.



The hospital charity is proud to support the needs of our elderly patients, providing them with 'added extras' that are not funded by the NHS. The Charity is aiming to provide the units with many 'added extras' over the years; most notably My Life Dementia Improvement System Software. Solihull Round Table has generously donated £1,500 to purchase one of these units. The My Life Units enable patients with dementia to communicate more effectively with staff and their

loved ones, and the Charity is looking to fund further units for the hospital.

Dementia is a syndrome that can affect memory, thinking, behaviour and the ability to perform everyday activities. By providing patients with interactive software it will aid their dialogue and improve their memory. The specialised software has been developed by carers for carers, helping to keep care focused on the patient and their wellbeing.

Justine Davy, Head of Fundraising for Solihull Hospital Charity, said: "The specialist My Life Dementia Improvement Systems will help staff to learn more about patients' interests, hobbies, likes and dislikes, allowing them to strike up engaging, nostalgic conversations making both the patients and themselves feel more at ease.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for people to get behind a local appeal that makes a difference to people's lives, at a time when it is most needed. We hope as many

tainment systems, called My Life Dementia Improvement Systems, as well as other e wards at Solihull Hospital.

people as possible recognise the chance to make a real difference and show their support for elderly patients at Solihull Hospital."

For dementia patients, the hospital can be a daunting and confusing place, many of the hospital's elderly patients with dementia are often admitted to hospital for another condition or an injury. This means that our dementia patients will frequently end up on wards that do not give them the appropriate mental stimulation and activities that they need, as a result, this can lead to a frightening experience for them.

Solihull Hospital Charity's Elderly Care appeal aims to provide a variety of 'added extras' to help support patients and their families. Examples of such 'added extras' could be as simple as special orientation clocks and signs that show whether it is day or night, dementia friendly crockery, dolls and large-pieced jigsaws.

Rachel Learmonth, Fundraising Manager at Solihull Hospital Charity, said: "While we have wards at the hospital that specialise in the treatment of elderly patients, many of whom have dementia, they will often stay on a ward that does not specialise in dementia and may be the only person on that ward with the condition. Because of this, we want to bring specialist activities and 'added extras' to many wards at the hospital, and that's why we are asking for community groups, businesses and members of the public to support our Elderly Care appeal."

Other extras that are not readily available on the NHS are pieces of equipment such as the Sara Stedy. The Sara Stedy enables one caregiver to transfer a patient safely and with ease. The Sara Stedy encourages mobility and provides enhanced standing aid for longer than what a nurse is able to hold a patient for. With the help of donations to the Charity's Elderly Care appeal, Solihull Hospital Charity will be able to give more patients the feeling of independence.

Katherine Roberts, Staff nurse for Solihull Hospital's Ward 9 spoke with the Charity about benefits from a staff perspective on the Sara Stedy, she said: "The Sara Stedy has just revolutionised the way that we are able to help our elderly patients. When they come to our clinics it's of great benefit for us to get their blood pressure lying down and standing up and some of the patients find it really difficult to transfer from a wheelchair to a bed for instance.

The Sara Stedy makes it so easy for them to move out as safely as possible, we can also transfer them easily with no injury to staff in the process."

A donation of £25 will provide orientation clocks to ensure that patients with dementia maintain a healthy routine.



A donation of £50 will fund dementia friendly crockery such as mugs, plates and cutlery.



A donation of £100 will fund numerous games, puzzles and activities to entertain elderly patients, enabling them to bond and socialise whilst in hospital.



£1,500 can fund one My Life **Dementia Improvement** System, £890 can fund one Sara Stedy.

Friend family donate £1,000 for Cancer Unit

On 16 April 2018 Edwin Friend sadly passed away after a lengthy battle with Leukaemia. Recently, his wife Jill Friend and their daughter Kathryn Preece donated an amazing £1,000.93 for Solihull Hospital Charity in memory of Ed. Out of the blue, in

2000, Ed was contacted and sadly told the news that he had Leukaemia. Ed was informed that he had Chronic Lymphocytic Leukaemia (CLL) and over the years there were many periods of remission and regular medication meaning that Ed lived a very full life.



Sadly in December 2017 things took a turn for the worse with his CLL changing to Acute Myeloid Leukaemia (AML). After many hospital admissions Ed passed away on 16 April 2018.

Jill Friend said: "We decided as a family that Ed would have liked the money to go to the new Solihull Day Unit as he had followed the progress with this project with interest.

"Ed could see how stressful it was for all the Heartlands Hospital staff working with constant pressures and limited conditions so he welcomed the development of a Ward 19 outpost at Solihull Hospital and he was looking forward to using it. He would have been delighted that some of the donations in his memory would go to this new development."

Rachel Learmonth, Fundraising Manager at Solihull Hospital Charity, said: "Thank you so much to the Friend family who donated this generous amount of money to the Haematology and Oncology Day Unit at Solihull Hospital. 

Solihull Hospital Children's Appeal

Solihull Hospital Charity has launched an ambitious fundraising appeal to completely renovate the Children's **Outpatients Department at the** hospital, transforming the spaces where the 17,000 children who visit the hospital each year are treated.

The appeal is raising money to refurbish five consultation rooms. the waiting area, the treatment room and the playroom in the Children's Outpatients Department, making them much more childfriendly. This renovation will complement the amazing quality of care that is on offer throughout the department.

The refurbishment will transform the department, and is being designed with children in mind. There will be activities aimed for all ages, from a soft play area for toddlers, through to a chill-out area complete with TV and games consoles for the older children and teenagers who visit the hospital.

Not only will this renovation make the department look and feel more welcoming, it will have a positive impact on the children who visit. For many children, a visit to Solihull Hospital Children's Outpatients department is their

first experience in a hospital. This can be a scary and unsettling time for them. Currently, the unit feels and looks very clinical but once the renovations have taken place. the space will offer a calming environment where children can take their minds off their treatment.

The refurbishment of the department will have a big impact on the staff that work there, as well as the children who are treated there. Dr Deepak Parasuraman, who works in the Children's Outpatients Department, said: "It is a real privilege to be a part of the Children's Outpatients department at Solihull hospital; I treat such a range of children with a diverse range of needs and am proud to be able to provide such a necessary service to young people in and around Solihull.

"However, the department needs a renovation to bring the standard of the surroundings up to that of the care on offer. New wall decorations, a more comfortable waiting room, and new modern toys will act as a distraction to children visiting the department allowing parents to relax, and the staff to treat the children as quickly and efficiently as possible."

One of the regular patients to

attend Children's Outpatients is Riley. Riley is seven vears old and he suffers with atopic eczema which means he constantly has eczema with regular flare ups. Riley's treatment involves daily baths, bandages and ointments to

try and control the flare ups on his skin. Riley's mum, Chris, said: "The treatment Riley has received has been life changing and made his eczema manageable." Riley really enjoys the company of the paediatric staff but the limited amount of toys and games provided are not always suitable



for a child of his age so do not occupy him whilst he is waiting. Children who are Rilev's age have a better understanding of why they are in hospital which can often make them anxious, especially if they know they will be having a procedure. Toys and games can take away the fear of being in hospital for children which is why refurbishing the children's departments at Solihull Hospital is so important to children like Rilev.

The Red Bag scheme

The Red Bag scheme is a simple yet effective way of improving communication between home and hospital care, making life easier for the patient.

145 of the bags, which have been funded by supporters donating to Solihull Hospital Charity, will be used to ensure that personal belongings, medication and documentation are kept together and are transferred smoothly from care home to hospital and back.



The bag stays with the patient from the moment they leave the home up until they return after being discharged from hospital. It contains standardised information about the resident and a section for personal belongings such as glasses and hearing aids.

The scheme will cut down on unnecessary delays by keeping all the important things in one place. Patient information is transferred safely and is available to those who need it.

Divisional Head of Nursing Ann Edgar said: "I

am delighted that we are launching The Red Bag scheme in Solihull. Similar projects have proved a great success in other parts of the country with many benefits for patients and staff and I am sure it will be the same here.

"This initiative should make sure the nursing team has everything it needs when a patient arrives in hospital and also help speed up the discharge process when a patient is ready to be leave hospital. We are very grateful for the generosity of Solihull Hospital Charity in making it possible for us to go ahead with the red bags scheme."

The Mesi tool

Thanks to yet another kind donation from the Friends of Solihull Hospital, three Mesi devices have been purchased for the Solihull Community Nurses.

The Mesi is a useful diagnostic tool for calculating the ankle brachial pressure index (ABPI), allowing Solihull Community Nurses to assess the pressure of blood flow in the lower legs. This information is essential for nurses when completing a comprehensive

holistic assessment with regard to the treatment of patients with leg ulcers. The outcome of this assessment helps the nurses to determine if the patient is suitable for treatments such as compression therapies, or further investigations.

The Mesi takes approximately five minutes to calculate



the ABPI, freeing up time for both patients and making effective use of the community nurse's time.

Cooling caps for cancer patients

Hair loss can be an extremely distressing side effect of chemotherapy for both men and women. Cooling caps can help to combat hair loss from certain chemotherapy drugs. The specialised cap is worn during a patient's chemotherapy sessions; it is filled with a cold gel that directly targets the hair follicles to potentially reduce hair loss. Solihull hospital charity has recently purchased six cooling caps at a cost of £125 per cap for



cancer patients that are receiving chemotherapy.

Pictured below are the old (left) and the new (right) cooling caps. The older caps were bulky and uncomfortable for patients, but the new, lightweight caps are far more comfortable and effective.
