We spent 5 minutes catching up with Laura Bird, who is one of the Chemotherapy Nurses at Solihull Hospital, to find out what her job involves!

What is your role at Solihull Hospital and how long have you been in this role?

I am one of the Chemotherapy Sisters for the Haematology and Oncology Day Unit. I began my career in Chemotherapy on Ward 19 Day Unit at Heartlands in October 2017, and moved over to Solihull with the Chemotherapy team in May 2018, once the new unit opened.

Your role must be challenging at times, can you tell us a little bit about what you do day to day?

Every day is different here. The role can vary day to day depending on where we are allocated. We will either be co-ordinating patients for the next day, taking charge of the main treatment room to ensure safe and efficient patient flow, or administering chemotherapy and supportive treatments.

What do you enjoy the most about your job?

I love the patient contact, and how we make a difference to our patients' lives. We are always learning on the job, so I really enjoy that too. Also, it's really nice to work with such a supportive and caring team.

What do you do when you aren't at work?

I have three horses who always keep me busy, I love going to gigs and festivals, I'm currently training for the Loch Ness Marathon, I go to the gym four times a week, and I'm also a drummer.

When you were young, what was your dream career?

My first dream career was to be an astronaut after my Dad took me to The Kennedy Space Centre, but I

always wanted to work with animals when I was younger, so I spent years wanting to be a vet or an equine vet. I knew I always wanted to have a role that cared for others.

How has Solihull Hospital Charity helped the Haematology and **Oncology Day Unit since** its opening last year?

The Charity has done amazing things for our unit in the past 14 months. We have received new scalp cooling caps which were desperately needed. they have funded several of our nurses to attend

university in order to benefit the team and our patients. We have also received much needed Air Gloves to help patients who are quite difficult to cannulate and we now have bright vinyls throughout the unit to help make it look more welcoming and create a more positive environment for our patients and their relatives.

What would you like to say to those who have fundraised or are currently fundraising for your unit?

On behalf of the whole team, I would like to say a huge thank you to anyone who has donated to Solihull Hospital Charity. All of the modifications to the unit and helpful medical equipment that we have received have made a massive difference to the way we deliver patient care as well as the experience that our patients have here in the Day Unit. We would not have been able to do this without your help. We want anyone who walks through our doors

Haematology

In May 2018, the Solihull Haematology and Oncology Day Unit was built due to the increasing strains and pressures on the Chemotherapy Department Ward 19 at Heartlands Hospital. The stresses meant that chemotherapy patients at Heartlands Hospital were having their treatments delayed and new patients were being put onto a waiting list.

However, due to the very generous support of local charities and businesses, the new unit at Solihull has been able to offer an extension of chemotherapy treatment to thousands more patients and overall, the number of patients that can now be treated, has increased by an amazing 170%.

At Solihull Hospital, some patients' chemotherapy treatments can range from three to six sessions over a number of days and each session can sometimes last for up to 10 hours per day. Many patients and their families can find this a very stressful and uncomfortable time.

In order to match the excellent care and treatment now available at the unit, the hospital charity is currently appealing for donations towards a major £100,000 project to improve the interior and exterior of the unit.

As part of this project, we would like to create a safe, relaxing and therapeutic area outside the unit to help alleviate the stresses that the thousands of our chemotherapy patients face. Our aim is to provide our patients and their relatives with a tranquil therapy garden filled with beautiful plants, a private gazebo and space to plant herbs and vegetables.

Gardening can be an excellent way for people recovering from cancer treatment to raise their levels of physical activity, as it involves gentle movements and helps to build up strength over a period of time. Tending to plants or flowers and watching them grow often enables people to regain a sense of control, offers time for reflection, and helps

provide a tranquil space in which patients can spend time with loved ones.

After a cancer diagnosis, it can often seem like you are no longer in control of your life - the cancer has taken over and with it comes a myriad of doctor appointments and hospital visits. Spending time in a garden environment or sitting and absorbing the tranquillity of nature, goes part way to giving patients back some control.


aesthetic. We have been so surprised by the calming influence of the newly improved décor.

Mobile Dental Unit

In 2018 Solihull Hospital Charity appealed to fund for a major £115,000 project, the Mobile **Dental Unit. Thanks to the** generosity of the Charity's fundraisers we are proud to announce that the Mobile Dental Unit is now built and ready to change the way that children view the dentist, making it less daunting and scary whilst significantly improving their oral hygiene for the future.

The Solihull Hospital Community Dentists currently visit schools

the unit has been designed to fit the needs of many children such as children with learning difficulties as well as being wheelchair friendly. However, for children with complex needs such as those who are on the autistic spectrum (ASD) this can still be a very intimidating place to be treated. Such children

eyes and distract the patients during a dental examination.

 A local anaesthetic wand which is a computer controlled dental injection. The flow rate of the local anaesthetic is controlled by a computer meaning that it is guaranteed to be slow and steady therefore reducing the standard















around the Solihull borough to ensure that children with the highest levels of tooth decay and the lowest attendance rates with local dentists still receive the best dental care possible.

Solihull Hospital Charity set up the Mobile Dental Unit appeal to help fund the brand new unit for the team. This service will offer dental advice, examinations and treatments for children at primary schools in the most deprived areas in the Solihull borough. Currently

are highly anxious and exhibit behavioural reactions when exposed to a clinical dental environment such as the bright fluorescent lights, sharp and painful injections into the mouth and the smell of unfamiliar utensils.

The Mobile Dental Unit may look impressive for many of Solihull's children, but for some it can still be a frightening

visit. Solihull Hospital Charity wants to make the unit the best it can possibly be by including sensory items that can make the dental treatments as efficient and comfortable as possible for patients with developmental disorders, examples include:

- A projector/TV screen in the unit to act as a visual distraction for when children are waiting to be examined.
- Video goggles to protect the

sharp, uncomfortable pain for our young patients.

With the aid of items such as this to the unit, the dentists will be able to treat their patients without causing them distress.

With the help of your donations, the Solihull Hospital Community Dentists will have access to specialised equipment that suits the needs of their younger patients. It will enable children, especially those with complex needs, to be treated as comfortably and as smoothly as possible. This will help to improve the oral health of children across the area, and reduce their anxieties around dental health for the rest of their lives.

Helen Rooney, Paediatric Nurse at Solihull Hospital's Children's Outpatients Department, said: "This appeal means so much to the team on the unit. Ultimately we want the very best for each and every child that is

> treated here: some children have lifelong conditions such as cystic fibrosis or diabetes that mean we have to see them regularly for check-ups. We would love a fun and playful area that is tailored for our patients' needs in mind. Currently the unit is quite outdated and it can be very boring for our patients to stay here for hours on end."

Whilst Solihull Hospital hosts excellent medical treatment and support for children and their families during their visits, the department lacks a child friendly setting that you would expect at a children's department, subsequently making a visit

Jaguar Land Rover raises funds to support their local hospital!

Solihull's Jaguar Land Rover team have donated an incredible £4,800 to support the Pulmonary Rehabilitation Centre at Solihull Hospital.

Pulmonary Rehabilitation is an exercise course for patients who have long term lung conditions such as

COPD, bronchiectasis, asthma, pulmonary fibrosis or other conditions which makes them breathless.



One of the patients that required pulmonary rehabilitation was Technical Lead Engineer at Jaguar Land Rover, Chris Dean. Chris has a long-lasting condition called Bronchiectasis, a condition whereby the lungs become abnormally widened; this can be controlled by exercise and medication.

Chris was referred to Solihull Hospital, he said: "When I was diagnosed with Bronchiectasis six years ago, it was life-changing news. But with the support of the Pulmonary Rehabilitation Centre at Solihull Hospital I was able to cope with my condition and learn how to manage it better. The staff and volunteers at the centre are so supportive and they have plans to improve the facilities and equipment available to patients. As a way to give something back and say thank you, I nominated the Centre for 'Motorvate', which is a Jaguar Land Rover scheme set up to support local charities and organisations. I'm really looking forward to seeing the Charity fund new equipment to help improve a patient's recovery and treatment plan."

The money will be able to provide patients with a vast array of exercise equipment that is 'over and above' what the NHS can fund, thank you team.


specifically with a patient's needs in mind, offering a more peaceful and comfortable environment for them whilst receiving chemotherapy treatment.

The musical toy plays a soothing melody when wound-up and the coloured balls rotate on their springs as the melody plays,

creating an audible and visual reward whilst encouraging touch.

Helen said: "Items such as this would not be possible for me to request without the generous donations of fundraisers. Being able to provide children with distractions such as this, really helps to make hospital a less clinical and scary place, it is also a huge benefit for parents as their child is no longer in distress."

Palliative Care dental kits

Mouth problems are common in palliative (end of life) care. Mouth problems can have a negative impact on quality



of life, both physically and emotionally. Mouth care should be part of daily routine care for all patients; however this can sometimes be a struggle for palliative patients.

Common mouth problems in palliative care can include dry mouth, infections and even drooling, all of which can cause severe discomfort and cause patients a lot of distress. This distress during the later stages of life is something that no one should have to worry about. However, thanks to your

donations, Solihull Hospital Charity has been able to provide Palliative Care with dental care kits that contain items such as a safe mouth swab and a soft tooth brush. This will help to alleviate pain in the gums that can often be a side-effect of the medication they need to take.

Friends of Solihull provide **Bladder Scanners**

The Solihull Continence Advisory Service has received two new portable bladder scanners from Friends of Solihull Hospital Charity (FOSH). The Continence Advisory Service is a service for housebound patients in Solihull providing confidential specialist clinical advice, support and understanding to men and women with bladder and bowel dysfunction.

The bladder scanners will enable patients to be assessed in their own homes thus reducing the need for a hospital visit and providing an immediate assessment. When a patient is having an issue emptying their bladder a scan is performed. If the results determine a catheter is needed it can be inserted at that time in the patient's home, or if needed then intermittent catheterisation can commence.

Not only do these scanners play a part in a continence assessment and monitoring process, which is invaluable for the continence team, they also enable the community nurses to attend a patient's home, reducing the need for a hospital visit. It also allows the service to facilitate a trial without catheter in the patient's home. If the trial is successful it has immense benefits to the patients as it allows patients to live catheter free and also reduces the risk of infection so the patient to able to live more independently. The equipment is accessible for all the Adult Community Nursing teams in Solihull and therefore improving patient outcomes and quality of life throughout Solihull. The Adult Community Nursing Services are very grateful for the continued support of FOSH in their services for housebound patients in the community, 80% of which are elderly frail.
