5 minutes with... Christine Morrell Paediatric Unit Health Play Specialist

We spent five minutes catching up with Christine Morrell, a **Play Specialist at Good Hope** Hospital, to get to know more about what her job entails.

Hi Chris, can you tell me a little bit about your job and what you do at **Good Hope Hospital?**

I work on the Paediatric Unit as a Health Play Specialist. Health Play Specialists work as part of the multi-disciplinary team providing play as a therapeutic tool for children and young people who are in hospital. As a play service, we work across sites providing play from 7:30am until 8pm. I work alongside fantastic nursery nurses and have enjoyed the job I do for 30 years now.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

I enjoy arranging for entertainers to come in and see the children and young people, as hospital can be very boring for not only the children, but the parents as well. It helps to give the children some normality and something to look forward to.

How does the Charity make a difference to your job?

We were able to put on a pantomime for the regular patients at the hospital and have a magician and balloon modeller in for the children. This wouldn't have been possible without the fantastic work that the hospital charity does. They were able to provide the funding for the pantomime and also provide selection boxes for the children. The Charity has been very supportive of the play team and is currently fundraising to improve the children's areas of the hospital, including the Children's Outpatients Department. The refurbishment will be great for the children and will make the area



brighter and all of the new games and play areas will be a distraction for them during appointments.

What do you do in your spare time?

In my spare time I enjoy watching Birmingham City Football Club, and I have two grandchildren who keep me extremely busy! I also have family in Yorkshire and Devon so I like to visit them and do lots of walking.

What would you say to anyone who is thinking about fundraising for Good Hope Hospital Charity?

If anyone is thinking of fundraising for the Paediatric Unit, please do. Every

penny makes a difference to the children and goes towards providing welcome distraction from what can be a very boring and distressing time.

Making the hospital

Last year we brought you the news of the Children's appeal launching at Good Hope Hospital. This year, thanks to your donations, we have been able to begin the £300,000 refurbishment of the Children's Outpatients Department at the hospital.

Each year, 30,000 children are treated at Good Hope Hospital for a range of conditions, including life-threatening and life-limiting ones. As well as children with these types of conditions, some children are making their first hospital visit at Good Hope Hospital. Visiting the hospital can be a daunting experience for children which can make the visit stressful for parents and staff as well.

The aim of the Children's appeal is to renovate and refurbish the children's departments within the hospital, and make them more child-friendly, calm and colourful. Although visiting the hospital may never be an enjoyable experience, it is sometimes hard for a child to understand why they are there, so filling the areas with toys, activities and games will make it a little bit better for them and relax them more.

Thanks to your donations, the refurbishment has already been completed in the Radiology Department where a colourful play area has been built with lots of toys

for children of all ages. Changes have also begun on the Children's Outpatients Department, where so far the entryway and main corridor of the department have been completed.

The main area of the department is now home to a spacious play area with toys for children of all ages including a game station, colouring pads, sensory toys and an interactive floor projector.

Laura Power, Fundraising Manager at Good Hope Hospital Charity, said: "Thanks to everyone who has donated to the Children's appeal so far, we have been able to begin the work on the children's areas throughout the hospital. Although

the work has started, we still need your help to complete it.

"The children who visit the hospital, whether it is for regular visits or a one-off, will benefit from the changes to the departments throughout the hospital. Having more colourful and child-friendly areas means that children will feel more comfortable in the hospital and will be less anxious about their visits, therefore making it less stressful for parents and staff too."

None of this would be possible without your support and there is still lots to be done, and you can still get involved with the Children's appeal and raise money to help support it at Good Hope Hospital. Midwifer

Having a baby is a very special time in parents' lives, and in the build up to the delivery date, the bond between mother and midwife becomes very strong as the midwife supports the mother through her pregnancy.

More recently, there has been an increase in demand for Midwifery Led Units where the midwife assists with a natural birth as the mother wants the midwife to look after her and her baby throughout the birth.

Parents in Sutton Coldfield who wanted to give birth in a Midwifery Led Unit would have to travel to


to benefit from the support of midwives in a specialist unit.

Good Hope Hospital Charity is now raising almost one million pounds to create the new unit which will support new mothers in the Sutton Coldfield area. The Charity is already over two-thirds of the way to its target after already receiving generous donations.

Friends of Good Hope Hospital have made their largest ever single donation to the Midwifery Led Unit appeal and have donated an amazing £150,000 which started the fundraising off last year.

With £300,000 left to raise, the work

Even though the couple had been through a traumatic time, they wanted to, along with their son, pictured, friends and family, raise money to help improve the bereavement services at Good Hope. A huge group of them raised an amazing £1,620 which topped their target of £500.

The couple said: "This is very close to us as the midwives who looked after us at Good Hope were amazing and we want to be able to give something back to them. The room is a great resource for families when dealing with such difficult situations."

New bereavements at Good

Over 11,000 babies are born at Good Hope Hospital and Heartlands Hospital every year, but unfortunately, some of these babies have complications along the way meaning that families will sometimes have to use the bereavement services.

Good Hope Hospital is lucky enough to have its own bereavement suite supported by the hospital charity, called the Snowdrop Suite, which helps care for mothers and families who sadly lose their baby through miscarriage, stillbirth or neonatal death. The unit provides a peaceful and private environment for parents in their time of need. So far, the Charity has been able to fund a CuddleCot for the suite. CuddleCots keep the baby cool, which extends the period of time

services that the hospital has to offer. The improvements will offer even better care for women and their families, and give them room to grieve for their loved ones.

The new project that Good Hope Hospital Charity is launching will mean that a bereavement delivery suite will be created on the existing Delivery Unit. Currently, mothers who know that they have lost, or will lose their baby are giving birth in the same place as every other mother. This suite will mean complete privacy with sound-resistant walls so they can give birth to their baby on their own and their family can stay in a separate, designated family room. Talking about the project, Clare Beeslev. Bereavement Midwife. said: "This new delivery suite will be invaluable to mothers who sadly lose their baby due

to neonatal death, miscarriage or stillbirth. Our bereavement services are used every week and we strive to give the best possible care, this new delivery room will help them achieve that and give families privacy during such a devastating time.

"Mothers will not be the only ones

affected by this refurbishment, partners, siblings and other family members will also benefit from the new suite as it will give them a chance to spend time together and come to terms with their loss." The Charity will continue to provide 'added extras' for the unit, from cutting-edge pieces of technology, to patient comforts and support, donations from supporters will allow the Charity to go 'over and above' for parents and families who, sadly, visit the Snowdrop Suite.

Family fundraise for lost babies

Sophie Langstaff was admitted to Good Hope Hospital delivery suite in May 2018 with the sad knowledge that her twins, Fraser James and Parker James, would not survive.



Fraser was born on 15 May 2018, passing away shortly after being born, but Sophie and her husband Jordan were able to keep him close thanks to the CuddleCot that keeps the baby cool, allowing parents to spend longer with their baby after they've passed away. Two days later, Parker was born and sadly, he also passed away shortly after being born.

Sophie said:

"It was without a doubt the hardest week of our lives."

After this incredibly difficult time, Sophie and Jordan were taken to the Snowdrop Suite, Good Hope Hospital's bereavement suite, which allows parents to spend time with their babies, and receive specialist support from the staff on the ward.

Now, Sophie and Jordan have turned their attention to fundraising for the ward where they were treated, and have hosted a glamourous ball at the Abbey Hotel in Great Malvern.

Sophie has close connections to Good Hope Hospital, having been born there herself and giving birth to her daughters Maddison and Olivia at the hospital.

Sophie said: "We are determined to raise money for the hospital where I was treated, we want to help other parents who will go through the same traumatic experiences that we endured. I know that the money we raise will help to make a difference to parents in the future."

The couple are not the only ones who are helping to fundraise for the new bereavement services, Sophie's mum helped to organise the ball and has also ran the Leicester marathon for the bereavement services at Good Hope after Sophie and Jordan spent time there with Fraser and Parker.

New baby heart monitors

The Charity has been able to fund new state-of-the-art equipment that can monitor the individual heartbeats of twins and triplets accurately. This will enable staff to analyse the heartbeat of a baby in pregnant women who are not in labour. The Charity has been able to fund this machine which will make a huge difference in supporting ambulatory antenatal care, reduce the inappropriate antenatal and inpatient admissions and the lessen the risk of induction to labour. delivers 3,500 babies each year and this monitor will ensure that the hospital is providing the best possible care for pregnant women and their unborn babies. Foetal monitoring is one of the most important procedures to prevent perinatal morbidity and mortality, so this is an incredible piece of equipment that will help improve the care of more patients at Good Hope Hospital.

Remembrance seeds

The Charity has also been able to fund bereavement seeds which are little packs of forget-me-nots that are being given to parents who spend time on the Snowdrop



Suite so they have a little something to remember their baby by. The Charity doesn't only fund the bereavement seeds for families; they also have the option to make a memory box for their baby whilst they are spending time with them on the bereavement unit. The memory box can contain pictures, foot and hand prints and the forget-me-not seeds.
