## Helping to save vulnerable little lives

Good Hope Hospital Charity is fundraising to bring a brand new state-of-the-art incubator to the Special Care Baby Unit that will help save vulnerable lives.

The £150,000 appeal is seeing seven brand new incubators brought across Heartlands and Good Hope hospitals which will provide the best care possible for the hundreds of babies who need it.

Laura Power, Fundraising Manager at Good Hope Hospital Charity, said: "This new incubator will benefit not only the babies on the unit, but also the staff and the parents. It is an incredibly difficult

Some babies can be born up to four months early and can weigh as little as one pound. These tiny, vulnerable babies require intensive care and support, and are cared for around the clock to give them the best chance of developing and growing.

The new incubator includes all of the equipment that the staff on the unit need to treat the tiny newborns, and they also allow the parents to have safe and easy access to their baby.

Some babies need specialist cooling treatment to prevent them from brain injuries, unlike the previous model of incubator, the new incubator offers this service, meaning that babies needing this will no longer need to be transferred to another hospital.

Laura Power, Fundraising Manager at Good Hope Hospital Charity, said: "This new incubator will benefit not only the babies on the unit, but also the staff and the parents. It is an incredibly difficult time seeing your baby poorly, but this new incubator will mean that parents can still bond with their baby and touch them whilst they are receiving all of the right treatment from the incubator."

The new incubator will make it easier for parents to be able to interact with their baby. They have the ability to change the name, date of birth and gender on the screens to make it more personal to them.

The new equipment can tell parents everything they need to know about their baby whilst they're in the incubator, from their temperature to their heart rate, which puts parents at ease a little bit.

Being able to hold your baby is a huge part of the bonding process,

and if your baby is really poorly, that can be delayed. This new incubator allows much easier access to the baby for nurses and parents without causing any heat loss or problems.

## minutes with... Lisa Smith Senior Sister, Frailty Assessment Unit

We spent five minutes catching up with Lisa Smith, a Senior Sister on the Frailty Assessment Unit at Good Hope Hospital, to get to know more about what she does in her job.

#### What is your job role and what does your job entail?

I am the Senior Sister on the Frailty Assessment Unit at Good Hope Hospital. I lead and manage an award-winning team and together we give the best care possible to our patients and families.

#### What do you enjoy most about vour iob?

I love making a difference to patients and their families, it means a lot to them when we do simple things like have a conversation with them and it's really great to see and hear that they are happy with their care at Good Hope.

#### How has the Charity made a difference to your job?

The Charity has helped me to get pieces of equipment that the NHS can't fund for us and there's no other way of us getting them. They have provided us with multiple things on the ward including a HoverJack® air mattress which helps the staff when a patient has had a fall and needs getting up off the floor. It isn't always easy lifting patients when they've had a fall, especially if they've injured themselves, so this is really helpful in situations like that.

The Charity has also helped me build a reminiscence trolley for our patients, which is full of all sorts of things to help dementia patients remember their past. It includes a box of smells which might remind



them of their past, and also books and old packaging to show them things that they might remember from when they were younger. The trolley really helps us to get a conversation out of some of our more anxious and weary patients but they love to talk about their past and what they used to do, it really helps us get to know the patients and makes them feel more comfortable with us as they may forget where they are at times.

#### What do you do in your spare time?

I spend a lot of time baking and spending time with my children when I'm not at work!

#### What would you say to anyone who is thinking of fundraising for **Good Hope Hospital Charity?**

Please go for it! The Charity is a vital resource to help when we need

In 2018 we brought you the news of the Children's appeal launching at Good Hope Hospital. Now, thanks to your generous donations, we have been able to complete the full refurbishment of the department at the hospital!

The Children's Outpatient's
Department is now home
to lots of toys for children
of all ages, bright and
colourful waiting areas
and treatment rooms and
is an all-round more childfriendly area. Toys including a
game station, colouring pads,
books, iPads, sensory toys and an
interactive floor projector are all
part of the department now to help
entertain children there.

The Children's appeal has completely renovated the children's areas within the hospital to make them more child-friendly, calm, colourful and relaxing to be in. Although being in hospital may never be relaxing or enjoyable, it is sometimes hard for a child to understand why they are there, so filling the areas with toys, activities and games will make them feel a little bit more relaxed and less stressed about their visit.



use some of the toys and sensory equipment during appointments to encourage children to open up and feel safe.

Talking about the completed refurbishment of the department, Sarah who is Charlie and Oliver's mom, said: "Charlie is seven and has cerebral palsy so is a quadriplegic, and Oliver is two and has muscular dystrophy, so trips to the hospital used to be very tricky for me. Oliver gets bored quickly and Charlie couldn't use the play area because of his wheelchair but now the department is more inviting and all of the different types of toys help occupy and entertain them whilst we are waiting for their appointments."



Each year, 30,000 children are treated at Good Hope Hospital for a range of conditions, including life-threatening and life-limiting ones. Children who are treated at the Outpatients Department may visit regularly, but it also might

be some children's first visit to the hospital. Visiting the hospital can be a daunting experience for children which can make hospital appointments stressful for parents and staff as well.

The new areas don't just benefit the patients. Parents now don't need to worry so much about distracting

their child whilst waiting for an appointment and know that they will be in a comfortable environment whilst at the hospital. The new refurbishment also means that staff have a better place to work in and can

"The children who visit the hospital, whether it is for regular visits or a one-off, will benefit from the changes to the departments throughout the hospital. Having more colourful and child-friendly areas means that children will feel more comfortable in the hospital and will be less anxious about

their visits, therefore making it less stressful for parents and staff too."

## Friends of Good Hope make spectacular donation to Midwifery Led Unit

Over 3,500 babies are born each year at Good Hope Hospital and by creating a new Midwifery Led Unit, more mothers will be able to benefit from the support of midwives in a specialist unit.

Parents in Sutton Coldfield who



wanted to give birth in one of these units would have to travel to another hospital, but now, Good Hope will have its very own unit at the hospital.

Friends of Good Hope Hospital have very generously helped us out with this project and have made their largest ever single donation of £150,000 to the Midwifery Led Unit appeal!

The unit will be a home to four new birthing rooms, two of which will have birthing pools. There will also be two new overnight rooms which will provide a home away from home for mothers, focusing on family centred care, creating a more relaxed environment.

## Sutton Park Tangent donates to breast services

The Sutton Park Tangent is a group of ladies who raise money for different charities and this year they chose to donate their money to Good Hope Hospital's breast care services after one of their members, Cathy Lance, was treated there.

Cathy, who used to work in the hospital's HR Department, said: "The treatment I had was excellent, I couldn't fault it. I just found that the breast care nurses were so good and so approachable, it made the situation a lot easier for me."

## Shirley and Konrad hold charity ball for Critical Care



Konrad Puchowski was taken to Good Hope Hospital with a high temperature and found out that he had sepsis, he was then treated on the Critical Care Unit.

Shirley and Konrad decided to host their very own charity ball for the Critical Care Unit and raised over £3,000 to thank the staff and the hospital for the care Konrad received.

Shirley said: "Konrad really is a walking miracle. One day I just thought he wasn't going to make it, they really saved his life."

As well as sepsis, Konrad found out he also had endocarditis which is an infection of the lining of the heart chambers and the heart valves, and renal failure.

The money they raised meant the hospital charity could purchase a SaraSteady hoist for the Unit which you can read more about on page 11.

I wish all young children were given these kits, they need a lot of support and help understanding in their own terms.

"As mother and daughter we togged up and left fear on the ground and we thoroughly enjoyed our skydive in memory of our beautiful friend Jessica."

## Great Midlands Fun Run 2019





Thanks to all of the donations from incredible fundraisers, Good Hope Hospital Charity has been able to fund added extras across the hospital to improve everyone's experience here.

#### **New hoist for Critical Care**

Thanks to kind donations from Shirley West and Konrad Puchowski, Good Hope Hospital Charity was able to purchase a new SaraSteady hoist for the Critical Care Unit at the hospital. Konrad was diagnosed with sepsis at the hospital in 2011 and was



put in an induced coma and treated on the unit so they have been raising money ever since.

This fantastic new piece of equipment was requested for by the staff on the ward and thanks to kind donations we were able to provide them with the hoist. The hoist allows staff to move patients around when necessary and is safer, easier and more comfortable for the patients who have limited mobility.

#### Time for tea

The hospital charity is proud to fund tea sets for every ward around the hospital so patients and their families can enjoy a cup of tea when they need it. It was common for staff on wards to purchase their own tea sets when they thought they needed them, so the new Charity funded tea sets are a huge help



for the wards and means families and patients have something to drink out of whilst on the ward.

tea sets for every ward at the hospital, we know that they are really popular with patients and families, and help to provide a feeling of home for patients in the hospital."

#### Frailty HoverJack® mattress

Patients who are being treated on the frailty wards are at high risk of tripping or falling over as they can be unstable on their feet.

The Hoverlack® Air Patient Lift is like a mattress which is placed on the floor where a patient has fallen or tripped

and they are lifted gently onto it. Once they are on it, the HoverJack® is pumped with air slowly which lifts them up to bed level where they can then be lifted safely into their bed.

This amazing new piece of equipment reduces the risk of further injury and distress to the patient who has fallen or tripped, and allows them to be examined in their bed for any injury caused after a fall instead of where they had fallen.

### Reminiscence trolley for older patients

A brand new reminiscence trolley has been funded for the older patients at the hospital. The trolley includes various items suitable for older patients with dementia. The items range from wartime memorabilia such as books and gas masks, chocolate and sweet packages from when they were younger, to picture books of Birmingham throughout the years.



The reminiscence trolley can really help patients with dementia as it gives them something physical that they can pick up and look through. Patients often feel more comfortable after looking through the things and it encourages them to open up and trust those around them if they forget where they are and spurs on conversations about when they were younger which in turn, improves their mood.

Lisa Smith, Senior Sister at Good Hope Hospital, said: "The Reminiscence Trolley is of amazing use to us and the patients. The bits inside can be given to patients to look through and can even help improve their mood and encourage them to talk about things in the past that they remember that made them happy."

#### **A&E viewing room**

The Accident and Emergency Department viewing room is not the first thing someone would think of funding for the hospital, but thanks to your kind donations we have been able to make difficult



circumstances a little bit more comfortable in the Accident and Emergency Department.

The viewing room is now brighter and furnished with comfortable chairs so families can be with their loved ones after they've passed away and away from the loud A&E Department.

Next door to the viewing room is a family room with sofas that can be used to take time away from the ward and for members of staff to talk to the families.

Laura Power, Fundraising Manager at Good Hope Hospital Charity, said: "The viewing room means that

families can be with their loved ones away from the ward after they have passed away. Being such a difficult time it is so important that families have their privacy and have somewhere to go to spend time with their family member."
