# Hooray! We're half way there!



The Rare Disease Centre Appeal is now a half way to its target of £1m and work is well under way.

Thanks to the generosity of the thousands who have made a donation, including readers of the Birmingham Mail and Sunday Mercury, the fundraising total has reached over £500,000.

The appeal, launched by the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham (QEHB) Charity in partnership with the newspapers, is to develop a centre of excellence for Rare Diseases.

The Rare Disease Centre will be based within a new Institute of Translational Medicine (ITM) which will be dedicated to developing and implementing ground-breaking treatments, technologies and techniques to accelerate the delivery of personalised healthcare for patients.

Head of Fundraising at QEHB Charity Justine Davy said: "We're delighted to have reached over £500,000 and want to thank everyone who has made a donation to our Rare

Disease Centre Appeal so far.

"We now need to focus on keeping this wonderful momentum going. We are grateful for the support of the Birmingham Mail and Sunday Mercury and for our partnership with the Pride of Birmingham Awards.

"Our goal was to raise £500,000 before the Awards took place and we are so proud to have got there.

"Please help us reach our target before the end of the year! Every penny makes a real difference to patients suffering from genetic disorders and their families. With your help we can fund a number of benefits including identifying new areas of research which could, one day, find a cure."

Dr Graham Lipkin, Consultant
Nephrologist, Clinical Lead for
RDC, added: "University Hospital
Birmingham NHS Foundation Trust
treats a range of rare conditions.
Many of these patients have
conditions that affect multiple
organs requiring input from a variety
of clinicians that fall across divisional
specialities.

"Currently, these patients attend multiple outpatient clinics which are often run in combination with other outpatient clinics. Transfer of rare disease clinics into the ITM will offer an opportunity to review the way services are delivered and change the way we work to deliver a first class service that meets the needs of patients."

Work on the new Institute of Translational Medicine within the old Queen Elizabeth Hospital started in May and is progressing to schedule.

Contractor Vinci Construction has soft-stripped parts of the ground, first, second, fourth and fifth floors and demolished interior walls on the fifth floor.

The project is due for completion in June 2015.








# 5 minutes with...

### What do you love most about your job?


There's loads of things I love about my job! The thing I love most is knowing that I have helped keep all the patients and staff at the hospital safe.

"My friends and I think the Rare Disease Centre is a great idea. It will be good to talk to other people who have rare diseases and know that you are not alone."









### Car crash survivor cycles 300 miles for patients

Dan, a 28 year old Graphic Designer from Stourbridge, cycled from London to Amsterdam with friends Damian Chana, Kionne Potter and Tom Meade to raise money for patients at QEHB.

Two years ago Dan was involved in a crash that left him severely injured. He explained: "Damian was driving when we crashed on the A456. My pelvis was completely shattered and I was unable to move.

"The QE is a fantastic hospital and I couldn't fault the care I received. This is our way of saying thank you to the amazing staff who took care of me."

So far Dan has raised £1,225 for QEHB Charity. He hopes to add to this total next year by taking part in another charity event.

### **Cancer survivor raises** thousands for QE Cancer Appeal

A West Midlands paramedic has raised hundreds for people with cancer, after fighting the disease himself.

In 2012, aged just 31, David Minard received the devastating news that he was suffering with advanced colorectal cancer.

newly qualified nurse on holiday in the French Pyrenees.

Whilst out cycling, she was hit by an out of control car and sustained life-threatening injuries. Flown to Perpignan hospital, she underwent 12 hours of surgery followed by brain surgery two days later when she suffered a stroke.

Returning to the UK a month later, Kate, under the care of Julian Cooper at Selly Oak Hospital, underwent months of daily physiotherapy, appointments with a number of consultants and over a dozen more operations.

Twelve months after the accident, Kate was able to return to work. She has since been promoted and is currently studying for her MSc.

"Initial prognosis was not great," said Kate. "Yes, I'd survived, but I was advised I may not walk again (both legs were smashed to pieces) and it was incredibly unlikely that I would be able to work.

"The support and care I received from the staff looking after me and the staff in the Emergency Department, who knew me, was second to none.

"The court case was finally settled last year and now I can put it all behind me, I feel ready to do something to raise funds for the hospital, and the air ambulance service."

He said: "I've never heard of another pro getting skin cancer and I wouldn't have thought people have thought about the risks. There's an 'I'll be alright' about it all because it's not like we're sunbathing."

# School girl receives Cyberknife treatment

A brave 13 year old from Allesley Park, Coventry has received CyberKnife treatment at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for cancer.

Rosie Abbott lives with her Mum Louise, Dad Mark, brothers Sam and Ellis, sister Megan, two dogs Dotty and Diesel and her handsome horse Jackson.

She previously received radiotherapy treatment but this year had treatment on the state of the art CyberKnife machine, which was purchased for the hospital by the QEHB Charity.

Louise said: "We were devastated to say the least to receive the news following a routine MRI during Rosie's remission period that her cancer had returned.

"We were equally shattered to hear surgery

would not be an option due to the location of Rosie's second tumour.

"To be offered the state of the art CyberKnife procedure was our only hope that Rosie would overcome this wretched disease once again."

CyberKnife is a noninvasive, pain-free alternative to open surgery in treating tumours. It enables very high doses of radiation to be targeted directly at the tumour with pinpoint accuracy without damaging the tissue.

Louise added: "Rosie is our inspiration and leads the way with her courage and bravery.

"We are elated that Rosie's treatment was very successful. She is now making good progress during her chemotherapy regime following CyberKnife treatment."

### Knitted Knockers receive a sprinkling of magic

QEHB Charity has awarded a Birmingham-based charity making 'knitted knockers' a grant of £250 under the Sprinkle Some Magic scheme.

Jo Dervisoglu and her team of volunteers around the UK knit and crochet 100% cotton 'breasts' and deliver them free of charge to women who have undergone mastectomies.

Jo triggered a huge response when she launched her website in January 2014 and sent out 30 knockers herself in just eight weeks.

"We want women to know that there is an alternative that is lightweight, takes the form of a real breast, is soft against the skin and breathable" Jo said.

"These knockers are made with love and filled with hope – a gift from one woman to another."

Jo set up a UK branch of the Knitted Knockers charity after visiting its US website and realising there was nothing similar in Britain.

"A woman will order a certain size, and one of the volunteers will pick up the order," Jo said.

"They knit the knocker shape and stuff it with poly-filled stuffing.

"The knitter chooses the colours depending on what yarn she has."

The charity is able to provide the knockers free of charge thanks to the generosity of the ladies who knit and crochet.

Jo added: "We want to be in a position to ensure that we can supply the ladies that knit and crochet and give up so much of their time to help with the materials they need to carry on providing this invaluable and much needed service. Can you please help by making a donation?"

# No more invasive brain operations


Invasive brain operations could soon be a thing of the past, thanks to pioneering work being carried out at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham.

Grandmother Maureen Lansdale experienced the fantastic work carried out by the neurosurgical team. In fact, her operation was the first of its kind in Europe.

Maureen suffered from intense headaches and temporary memory loss, caused by an abnormality in her brain called a vascular malformation.

After over a year of struggling with crippling symptoms, her life was changed when she underwent endoscopic surgery at the QE to remove the abnormality.

**QEHB Charity are** bringing the most advanced brain surgery machines to Birmingham in the fight against brain tumours and cancers.



This is the first time in Europe that a vascular malformation has been removed through this minimally invasive technique.

Maureen said: "I didn't want my illness to win, but I was forced to spend a lot of time in bed.

"Luckily Dr Paluzzi told me about a new way to remove the abnormality which had never been done at the QE before, or even in Europe."

The endoscopic technique involves surgically removing the vascular malformation by using the nostrils as 'key holes'.

Alessandro Paluzzi, who operated on Maureen alongside Mr. Shahz Ahmed, ENT surgeon, explained: "Maureen's abnormality was located at the base of her brain which meant the procedure didn't require any manipulation of normal brain, leading to a better outcome, faster recovery and no visible scars."

Maureen commented: "I owe my life to Dr Paluzzi and the rest of the team who cared for me. I can't wait to fundraise for the appeal after my recovery."



QEHB Charity needs to raise £250,000 to purchase three new pieces of state of the art kit that will reduce waiting times and enable even more patients to access the surgery. These are a 3D HD Endoscope that will allow surgeons to better see the shape of the tumour, an Endoscope Holding Arm which will mean operations can be carried out by one surgeon instead of two and a Sonopet Ultrasonic Aspirator that employs ultrasounds to reduce the tumour to dust and suck it out without generating heat that can cause nostril burns.
